All electronic resources chosen for use in the classroom will be carefully previewed and evaluated by the appropriate content coordinator or their designee to meet identified instructional objectives for the age and grade level of the students and the Fair Use Guidelines of the US Copyright Office.

All electronic resources obtained from outside sources that are not part of the District's curriculum will be screened in advance by appropriate content coordinators and other district personnel as needed.

The following guidelines will apply in regards to movies and television programs:

1. Films with Motion Picture Association ratings can be shown in accordance with the following:
 - a. Elementary level: G-rated films only.
 - b. Junior high level: G- and PG-rated films; clips must adhere to criterion (1), below.
 - c. High school level: G-, PG-, and PG-13-rated films; clips must adhere to criterion (1), below.
 - (1) Films that depict nude/seminude figures, sexually suggestive material, or obscene gestures or words are prohibited from being shown in the District, regardless of the assigned rating.
 - (2) Films with ratings of PG-13 (excludes high school), TV-14, TV-MA, R, or NC-17 are prohibited from being shown in the District or in connection with any school-related activity. The District may develop a list of approved commercial films to be used for educational purposes.
2. Programs and resources rated with the TV Parental Guidelines system can be shown in accordance with the following:
 - a. Elementary level: TV-Y (all children), TV-Y7 (directed to children seven years of age or older), or TV-Y7FV (children seven years of age or older with fantasy violence), and TV-G (general audience).
 - b. Secondary level: TV-Y, TV-Y7, TV-Y7FV, TV-G, and TV-PG (parental guidance suggested).

The District strongly discourages screening full-length movies and television programs as this violates the terms of the Fair Use

Guidelines, but teachers may use clips to reinforce a curriculum concept as appropriate.
